Our Further and Vocational Higher Education Institution offers a wide range of short-cycle courses in Computing, International Business, Administration and Finance as well as Automobile Industry. These two-year courses are delivered to students from a wide variety of backgrounds who wish to become part of the labour market or enter university.

Since 2009 our institution has offered the possibility of doing an Erasmus internship to students in their second year who wish to live and work abroad as part of an exchange programme.

Year after year the number of students undertaking their Erasmus internship has increased due to the good response to this programme thanks to the information provided by the International Office and the Erasmus Coordinator.

During the last term of the second year our students do their internship in companies which provide suitable on-the-job training tutored by a mentor in the host company.

We have set up partnership with enterprises based in the United Kingdom, Ireland and Italy.

We choose enterprises whose profile match our students' profiles. Above all, we take into account the necessities and demands of the enterprise together with those of our students. Taking into consideration what the enterprise expects from our students, we consider the students' suitability to successfully carry out the tasks they will be entrusted.

That is the moment when we offer our students the possibility of an internship abroad. The students' Tutors together with the Coordinator have a meeting in which we make our students a presentation of the company which includes different aspects of the company such as location, staff, characteristics, ...

All Erasmus activities will be given full visibility through our website where our Erasmus Blog is included. In addition, the International Office together with the Erasmus Coordinator will provide information through talks to our students in Higher Education Courses.

By implementing the Erasmus Programme:

We aim at providing suitable on-the-job training for our students creating strong links between our institution and our students' companies.

We aim to increase our students' employability and job prospects opening up the possibility of a career in a wide range of areas throughout commerce, industry, entertainment and the public sector. Also, the programme enables successful students to progress to a University Degree if they wish to do so.

We aim at offering our students the possibility of working in a foreign country, as well as learning and understanding the host country.

We aim at creating a sense of community among interns from different countries since the Erasmus experience is considered as both a time for training and a chance to socialise.

We aim at enriching our students' lives in the academic and professional fields as well as improving self-reliance and self-awareness.

We aim at providing our students with a better sense of what it means to be a Europena citizen.

We aim at carrying out staff exchanges so as to exchange professional experiences in teaching and training.
